
St. Luke 2: 22-40 describes the Feast of the Presentation of the Infant Jesus Into the Temple. (February 15/2)

When Jesus was forty days old, the Virgin Mary and St. Joseph the Betrothed brought Christ to the temple in order to fulfill the law and dedicate Him to God.

The Orthodox Christian tradition of Churching a mother on her return to church with her child for a blessing, 40 days after the birth of the baby, is continued from the Jewish rite observed in this beautiful feast.

An ancient hymn for this Feast written by 9th Century female saint, St. Kassiani:

How can I hold Thee as a Child,
Thou, who holdest everything together?
How do I bring Thee to the temple,
Thou, who art beyond goodness?
How do I deliver Thee into the arms of the elder,
Thou, who sitteth in the bosom of the Father?
How dost Thou endure purification,
Thou, who purifieth the whole corrupt nature?"
So sayeth the Virgin, the temple, who containeth God-Marvelling at Thy great condescension, O Christ.

Snowdrop Flowers

Old English names for Snowdrop Flowers are Christ's Flowers, Purification Flowers, Candlemas Bells, and Fair Maids of February. They are named as such, in honour of the great and ancient feast day of The Meeting of the Lord in the Temple! (February 15/2) This feast has been celebrated since 450 AD, and church candles are also blessed on this day, as we remember Christ is our Salvation, and the Light of the World. Centuries later, there arose a European folk custom that if, on

the Feast Day of the Presentation, any burrowing animal who came out of his hole to see the light (and his shadow), would immediately return again to his den - predicting that winter would indeed be lasting six more weeks. European immigrants brought this folk custom to North America in the 1800's, however, and sadly, the civil calendar promotes "Groundhog Day" over the Feast of the Presentation.

St. Bridget of Ireland Feast Day on Feb. 14/1 Born in 451 AD

<u>Now to Weave a St. Bridget's Day</u> Cross from Rushes

St. Brigid's (Bridget's) association with fire and the

closeness of her feast day to the Feast of the Meeting of our Lord in the Temple (also known as **Candlemas**), a day celebrating Christ as the Light Unto the Nations, links the two Feasts. St. Bridget is also known as *Brigid*, and affectionately as *Bride*, *Bridey*, or the *Mary* of the Gael. She is patroness of dairy maids, infants, midwives, blacksmiths, poets, nuns, and students. Along with Saints Patrick and Columba (Columcille), she is also the patroness of Ireland. St. Bridget is usually depicted in icons as a nun with a Cross woven from rushes and with a miraculous fire (a candle, lamp, or bowl of fire). May we strive to acquire the gift to see Christ in every person, as St. Bridget did.

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St. Caedmon

Feast Day on Feb. 24/11

St. Caedmon (**mid 7th century AD**) is the first known *English author* of the earliest recorded poem in Great Britain.

In the eighth century, Venerable **Bede** wrote that St. Caedmon was initially a herdsman, with an unpleasant singing voice.

One night, in a heavenly dream, St. Caedmon heard the angelic hymn - *Creation*. The next day he shared what he heard, and to the astonishment of all, sang this as beautifully as it had been sung to him.

When the holy <u>St. Hilda</u>, abbess of <u>Whitby Abbey</u> nearby learned of

this, she encouraged St. Caedmon to join the Yorkshire monastery.

This same Abbey had previously hosted the important **Synod of Whitby** in 664, which included the correct calculation date of Pascha... in order for Britain to celebrate it the same time as Rome and the East.

This St. Caedmon Icon is from the **Orthodox <u>Mull Monastery</u> of Celtic Saints**, which the sisterhood has sent donations to.



More on the history of the miraculous **Montreal copy** of the **Iveron Icon held by Brother José**, the Icon's keeper.

The original icon, is preserved in a monastery on Mount Athos, and according to tradition, was painted by the Holy Apostle and Evangelist Luke.

Many parishioners of St. Sophia Parish were blessed with the opportunity to be able to visit and venerate the Montreal Iveron Icon, when Brother José travelled with it to Vancouver BC, back in the late 1980's and early 1990's, before his martyrdom in Greece in 1997.

We have an <u>un</u>-streaming copy of the Montreal liveron lcon at our church.




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Prayer Appeal From our Orthodox Neighbours at Victoria's Elk Lake



ith these words, envoys sent from Russia by Prince Vladimir in the year 987 recorded their impression of Constantinople's awesome Orthodox Cathedral, Hagia Sophia. They had been sent to search for the true religion. Within a year of their report, Prince Vladimir and the Russian people were baptized in Christ by Orthodox missionaries. Today, as in Prince Vladimir's time, the Orthodox Church – fully aware that man is a union of body and soul – uses all the beauty of creation to move her faithful children to prayer and worship: icons, beautiful singing, sweet-smelling incense, and majestic services.

The Greek word 'Orthodoxia' means 'correct praise' or 'correct teaching' and in the Orthodox worship the praise and teaching are closely interwoven.

Jesus Christ founded His Church through the Apostles. By the grace received from God at Pentecost, the Apostles established the Church throughout the world. In Greece, Russia, and elsewhere, the True Apostolic Church continues to flourish, preserving the Faith of Christ pure and unchanged.
