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The Forty Holy Martyrs of Sebaste

& Gradition of Sky Lark Buns

The feast day of the Forty Martyrs of Sebaste falls on March 22/9, during Great Lent. They were all soldiers in the Roman army who steadfastly believed in the Lord Jesus.

When the persecution of Christians began during the reign of Licinius, (320 AD) they were brought to trial before the commander, and after the endurance of many sufferings, and death, they attained the joyous reward reserved for those who give their lives for Christ.

The Holy Fathers of the Church refer to Great Lent as a fasting spring, when the souls of the faithful are sown with seeds of divine grace - thence yielding up a harvest of good deeds throughout the year that follows.

The unwavering endurance of the forty martyrs exemplifies to the faithful; perseverance to the end... in our "small" case... to the end of the forty days of the fast, to attain the great and joyous heavenly reward of celebrating Holy Pascha, the Resurrection of Jesus Christ.

A special prayer mentioning these Forty Holy Martyrs of Sebaste is also placed in the Orthodox Wedding Service (referred to as a "crowning") to remind the bride and groom that spiritual crowns await them in heaven also, if they remain as faithful to Christ as these saints of long ago.



Buns shaped like birds are traditionally baked to celebrate the Forty Martyrs of Sebaste's feast day. Lark Bird buns are baked for the day, and are also shared after church on the first Sunday after the Feast of the Holy Martyrs.

These remind us of the Forty Martyrs' steadfastness, and inspire our souls, to soar heavenward upon the wings of divine love - looking unto Jesus, the Author and finisher of our lives.

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How to Make the Larks

- Take a piece of risen yeasted bread dough, about the size of a medium egg, and roll it out on a lightly floured board into a long ropey piece, about 5 inches long.
- Tie it loosely into a knot, with approximately equal length protruding from both ends.
- · Put on lightly greased cookie sheet.
- With a pair of scissors, cut a "beak" on one end of the knot, and on the other end of the knot, cut a "tail" into about 3 or 4 feathered strands.
- · Push 2 peppercorns firmly into the head as eyes.
- Do not put birds on cookie sheet too closely together, as they spread a bit as they bake.
- · Cover, let rise again for about half an hour.
- Pop into a preheated 375* oven and bake about 15 20 minutes or until golden brown, depending on your oven.
- To make tastier larks, sometimes honey is added to the dough, as well as lemon or orange zest. Some people prefer to use currants for the eyes.
- Birds are easy to bake ahead of time to freeze and when needed, thaw for a couple hours. (Fallen eye-peppercorns during freezing can be readily inserted back into thawed birds.)





The Writings of <u>Staretz</u> Silouan 1866-1938 by <u>Saint Sophrony</u>

<u>St. Silouan</u> was a Russian peasant whose only formal education consisted of two winters at the village school.

But on Mt. Athos, he was taught of God and attained wisdom and spiritual maturity akin to that of the Desert Fathers.

Wisdom from Mount Athos is a collection of the notes which Staretz Silouan penciled on odd scraps of paper. On the whole, his writing recalls the splendor of the great liturgical texts of the Orthodox Church.



ith these words, envoys sent from Russia by Prince Vladimir in the year 987 recorded their impression of Constantinople's awesome Orthodox Cathedral, Hagia Sophia. They had been sent to search for the true religion. Within a year of their report, Prince Vladimir and the Russian people were baptized in Christ by Orthodox missionaries. Today, as in Prince Vladimir's time, the Orthodox Church – fully aware that man is a union of body and soul – uses all the beauty of creation to move her faithful children to prayer and worship: icons, beautiful singing, sweet-smelling incense, and majestic services.

The Greek word 'Orthodoxia' means 'correct praise' or 'correct teaching' and in the Orthodox worship the praise and teaching are closely interwoven.

Jesus Christ founded His Church through the Apostles. By the grace received from God at Pentecost, the Apostles established the Church throughout the world. In Greece, Russia, and elsewhere, the True Apostolic Church continues to flourish, preserving the Faith of Christ pure and unchanged.
